

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

Gary Rance 17/4/12 by Rob Sheehan

Gary's project was a hand mirror in Bubinga. He had already cut the blanks to size on a bandsaw, and drilled the hole for the handle. Gary said the hole must always be drilled in the side grain, never in the end grain. The mirror blank was mounted on the lathe using a screw chuck. Gary used a finger nail profile spindle gouge to turn the blank round,

and then shape the front face. Once the face was flat, Gary marked the diameter of the mirror, allowing 1mm extra for movement of the wood. He then cut a recess for the mirror that was 1mm deeper than the mirror. The edge of the blank was rounded over. Inside the recess, Gary cut a groove wide enough to take the chuck jaws. This groove will be hidden behind the mirror. After sanding and finishing the front face, Gary reversed the mirror onto the chuck, using the recess cut earlier. He finished rounding over the edge and used a beading tool to cut two decorative beads on the back of the mirror. The screw chuck hole






mounted a piece of ebony in the chuck, domed the end and cut a spigot to match the hole in the mirror back. This was then sanded to 600 grit and parted off. Gary then moved on to the handle. Using a steb centre drive, he mounted the blank between centres and turned it round with a roughing gouge. Gary cut a spigot to fit the hole in the mirror and used a template (or scratch stick) to mark and turn the handle decoration. This was also sanded to 600 grit, sealed and sprayed with lacquer. Gary said the mirror would sell for £45.








John Johnson 18/9/12 By Rob Sheehan

John started by bringing out a very modest 12"x 8" x 1" board of ash and asked us what we would do with it. After several cries of "burn it", he then produced a 4" deep bowl produced from the same sized board! Using Blue Peter type "here's one I made earlier"

models, John proceeded to show us how to convert a flat board into a bowl. The first stage was to mark out the board with a number of 1" thick concentric circles. John then cut the board down the middle of the circles.

After tilting the bandsaw table to 45° , John cut out the half circles. The angled cut means that the circles will now stack on top of each other. They are then glued up, rotating each circle through 90° so that the cut lines are staggered. John makes a separate base with a dovetail spigot. He has a home



made press for clamping the pieces while the glue sets.



The segmented bowl is then ready for turning. Using a 3/8 "bowl gouge, John shaped the outside, cutting from base to rim. A shear scrape was used as the finishing cut. This can then be power sanded from 120 grit to 320 grit. The inside was then turned, using a 3/8" bowl gouge from rim to centre. John switched to a 1/2" bowl gouge

to reduce the vibration. A spindle gouge was used to flatten the rim. This too, was sanded 120g to 320g, finishing with waxed (carat flex) sandpaper. John then wire brushed the outside to remove the softer grain, ready for liming. Chestnut green spirit stain was applied, followed by Chestnut



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liming wax using a cloth. Surplus liming wax was removed using paste wax on a paper towel. John then waxed the inside and reversed the bowl



once more on the chuck to remove the base spigot.


John's next project was a lid for an already turned bowl. The lid was to contain inlays and a finial. This is a useful way of using up offcuts. The main body of the lid was padouk. This had a pau amerillo insert. The insert

had a wenge insert. John mounted a piece of padouk in the chuck and turned a spigot that was an easy fit into the bowl. He then used a 1/4" spindle gouge to hollow out the underside of the lid. John drilled a 5mm hole in the centre (for the finial) and decorated the underside with lines and a bead. This was finished with friction polish.

John then made a jam chuck to hold the padouk, while he turned the top of the lid. A recess was cut for the amarillo. The amarillo was glued into

the recess and the flattened. Another recess was cut for the wenge. After gluing in the wenge, John turned the top of the lid to shape. He marked the centre and drilled a 5mm hole. The lid was sanded and finished with friction polish. John then turned a finial out of bubinga. The hole on the inside of the lid was hidden with a button made from another piece of bubinga.





Andy Lodge 16/4/13 By Rob Sheehan




To loosen up a bit since it was his first demonstration in a while, Andy turned a miniature chess pawn about 10mm tall. He used a spindle gouge with the wings swept right back. He also used a small skew




chisel and a narrow parting tool. Andy next demonstrated the use of Fimo® polymer clay. These come as small tubes of clay with pat-

terns running down the centre - a bit like a stick of rock, but each one is only 5mm diameter. He was selling packs of 10 clay sticks and little pots of clear resin and hardener for $\pounds 10$. Various designs - fruit, flowers, flags etc are available.



was the use of Fimo, so I intend to concentrate on that. Having turned a box, Andy cut a recess in the lid. The recess was undercut so that the resin is trapped in the recess. The recess was approximately 5mm deep. Andy uses a scalpel to cut slices off the Fimo sticks. He then stores each design in a different pill box compartment until they are needed.





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Andy covered the bottom of the recess with a thin layer of resin/hardener mix. He then used the tip of a scalpel to pick up each slice of Fimo and place it in a ring around the recess. A slight adjustment of the spacing may be necessary to get a good fit. A second ring, inside the first, is then placed I position. This continues until the design is complete. Andy then covers the Fimo with another layer of resin/hardener mix. To remove any bubbles from the resin, Andy places the box lids in a covered Pyrex dish. This is then placed in a vacuum bag for 5 minutes. Andy lets the resin cure for two days before turning the box lid. He uses a spindle gouge to flatten the end and clean up the join between wood and resin. Andy sands from 180 grit to 1200 grit before polishing the resin with Pound Shop brasso or T-cut.

Andy's next project was a Cabriole leg. This involves off-centre turning. Diagram 1 shows the various centres to be used for a leg for a round table. For a square table, the offset centres must be marked towards the flat sides of the leg, not towards the corners. With the leg on true centres, Andy turned the leg to round, leaving a square pummel. He then turned a chamfer and a half bead at the top of the leg and a bead at the bottom of the leg. Using only the off centre mark at the bottom of the leg, Andy cut a cove in the bottom ³/₄ of the leg. The depth of the cove is determined by the amount of unturned wood at the back of the leg. Stop turning when this is 15mm wide. Andy then mounted the leg on the true bottom centre and the off centre at the top. He then turned another cove in the top ³/₄ of the leg. This time, the width of unturned wood is 20mm.

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


Diagram 1: Cabriole Leg. Copyright © Andrew Lodge. Reproduced with permission.





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Paul Hannaby 18/6/13 By Rob Sheehan



Paul is based in the Forest of Dean, Gloucestershire, so we were lucky that he was prepared to travel so far for an evening demo.

Paul's first project was a natural edge, thin stemmed goblet in Yew branch wood. After checking that the stem would avoid the pith, Paul trued up the end and cut a chucking spigot. He then roughly turned it to round before mounting in in a chuck. Using a 1/2" finger nail profile spindle

gouge,

Paul drilled out the centre to a depth of about 2 1/2". The hollowing was done with the gouge, followed by a ring tool and finally a teardrop scraper to smooth out any ridges. Paul then shaped the





outside of the goblet's bowl with the spindle gouge before sanding 150 grit to 400 grit. He used Chest-

nut sanding sealer, cut back with 0000 steel wool and finally, a

coat of Renaissance wax to finish. Paul then cut a v-groove to separate the bowl from the stem of the goblet. To support the bowl while the thin stem was being turned, Paul used a polystyrene ball inside the bowl, held in place with a cup centre. The stem was turned 1" at a time. Another v-groove was used to separate the stem from the foot.



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For a decorative piece, Paul said that the foot should be smaller than the bowl. However, for a goblet that will be used, Paul said the foot should be the same size as the goblet opening.

Before finally parting off, Paul turned a ¹/₄ cove on the edge of the foot. You may have noticed the dead knot hole in the final goblet. This, and the fact that Yew had been used, makes this a decorative piece only. Paul also uses Laburnum branch wood for goblets.

Paul's second project was an Ash goblet with a barley twist stem. The goblet making process was the same as before, except for the stem being left a little thicker. Paul recommends Stuart Mortimer's book "Techniques of Spiral Work" for anyone interested in creating twists.

Paul uses a series of coarse and fine round files and Microplanes to cut the twist. Gauging the angle by eye, Paul used the coarse file to start a groove at the bottom of the stem. By rotating the lathe by hand as he cut

the groove, Paul ended up with a spiral from bottom to top of the stem. Starting half way round the stem from the first spiral, he then cut a second spiral. A larger file was then used to enlarge the spirals to about 2/3 the depth of the file. Using the same file at 90° to the stem, Paul takes off the top corners. A fine file at 45° takes off the bottom corners. Paul then wrapped abrasive round a thin dowel and sanded the grooves at all angles. He finally repeated the process with the lathe running at a slow speed.



Paul said that if he is making a pair of goblets, then one will have a clockwise spiral and the other an anti-clockwise spiral.
