

#### Work by Bill Randle



The boxes are made from Tulip Wood, Purple Heart and I think Rose Wood but not sure. The height of the boxes are 75mm to 90mm and have been finished using Chestnut Cut'n'Polish then



Carnauba Wax Stick. I would just like to say how well made the hinges are from Prokraft and are also made in 56mm and 100mm dia.

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#### In the Workshop Drill bit sharpening <sup>By</sup> Philip Stephens

If your anything like me, then over time you will start to collect a large number of drill bits both imperial and metric. It's also with certainty that you will need to use drills for boring guide holes using your arbor on your

lathe's tailstock or using the drilling process as part of the prep work to support your lathe work. As the drills start to blunt, at some point you will need to think about replacing the drill bits or sharpening them. Sharpening drill bits can be done by line of sight on a grinder providing you can keep the angle correct and remove the exact amount of material of both cutting edges to keep the central cutting point to the drill; or you can buy a drill bit sharpener unit or grinder attachment to do the job. In this article I'm looking at possible options for regrinding drill bits.

The two units I have looked at are both by Sealey, but there are a number of company solutions on the market but whatever brand your prefer. They all fall into the same basic two categories of an independent separate unit or an add-on attachment from a separate supplier or the manufacturer of the grinder unit itself.

The first, the Sealey SMS2008, is a drill bit sharpener unit which uses a diamond cutting wheel to sharpen any HSS titanium, cobalt, carbon steel or split point drill bits from 3mm to 13mm. The unit is self-contained and comes with an alignment jig which allows you to keep the drills cutting edges at the correct angle and only takes off what is needed to sharpen the cutting edges. The second, is the Sealey SMS01, which is the attachment

counterpart for any existing wheel grinder system. This unit doesn't come with a separate alignment

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jig or grinder and requires more manual adjustment to grind the correct angles on a drill.

#### Just a safety notices to start:



It is recommended to always wear safety goggles when using any of the drill bit devices.

#### Process for sharpening a drill bit using sharpener unit device



Place your blunt drill loosely in the setting lever tool supplied with the sharpening unit



Depress the setting lever on top of the sharpening unit and insert the setting leaver tool into the unit and align the drill for grinding.



Remove the setting lever tool with the align drill and switch on the unit. Place the bit holder into the sharpening port and gently turn the setting leaver tool until the grinding noise has stopped. Remove the bit holder and rotate it 180° then reinsert the bit holder, repeating the operation for the second side of the drill. Enquiries Welcome. #### Process for sharpening a drill bit using an add-on attachment for a grinder

**Note:** for safety the recommended alignment of an add-on drill bit should be from the front of the grinding wheel. The tool can be used on the side of the grinding wheel however, this is **NOT** recommended and can weaken or add stress to the grinding wheel which may cause it to fracture at high speed. The curve of the front end of the grinding wheel does not affect the cutting edge of the drill or its sharpness.

#### **Right:**

Make sure the end of the drill is sitting in the adjustment side






Make sure the lip rest black bar is adjusted inside the drill you intend to cut. Use the adjustment screws to slide and adjust the lip rest bar so that it is about 1- 2mm from the drill cutting edge. Tighten the locking bar screw to hold the drill.

The unit is fitted with a drill cutting clearance angle adjustment which changes the cutting edge angle to achieve the desired cutting clearance. For wood turning I would recommend an angle of about 68° which will use 100% of the diameter of the drill bit when cutting wood.







Start your angle grinder and move the attachment tool back and forward across the grinder till no more sparks are produced.



Unclamp and rotate the drill by 180° to cut the second edge by repeating the process as above.

#### **Conclusions**

Both the units are limited to sharpening only standard twist and ground type drills bits. You can't sharpen Forstner, wood twist, bead point or auger drill bits with these systems; most of these types of drills have multiple cutting edges and require hand sharpening. However, the above solutions do offer an alternative to hand sharpening of small twist drill bits at a reasonable price.

<u>Sealey SMS2008 drill bit sharpener unit</u>: The unit is very compact, simple to use and to can sharpen the edge of a drill to a standard that can help prevent tearing of the wood when drilling with a blunt drill. It also can handle longer twist drill bits than its attachment counterpart.


Its disadvantage is the cost over an add-on attachment tool and the fact that you can't set the clearance angle for the drill point which is fixed to 59° by the internal wheel grinder. Saying that, I have not had any problems with using bits sharpened using this tool when pen turning or woodturning.

<u>Sealey SMS01 drill bit grinding attachment:</u> It's important to remember that although the attachment is cheaper than its counterpart. It is also a compromise add-on to a grinder system that you must already have purchased. So, you need a grinding unit that you can fix the attachment to as well as a grinding wheel that will dissipate the heat when using the grinding process. The unit also has some flexing as you grind the drill which can affect the grinding angle. Saying that, one of the advantages is that you can also sharpen larger drills using this method than with the sharpening unit. Normally up to 19mm can be fitted into the attachment.

The main disadvantage with this unit is the setting-up and adjustment of the unit for sharpening a drill bit which takes much longer and it has to be re-adjusted when cutting the second side. It is also very easy to overgrind the drill and change the tempering of the steel. With woodturning that's not likely to be a major problem except if you also need to use your drills on harder materials like steel. However, the instructions with the unit do cover the alternative angle to use on the drill when you are using different materials and it doesn't take long to change that angle on the drill if needed. ■

#### Hello Graham

Attached are a couple of photos showing my first turned piece of 2022, made at our club workshop. It's a fully hollowed Yew twig vase, 110mm dia x 225mm tall. The hole in the top is just 12mm dia. The timber was a length of non-round branch, acquired *gratis* from a neighbour of Phil Steele, about 3 years

ago. I mounted the log slightly off centre, primarily to maximise the overall diameter of the hollowed portion. Happily, by doing so it also produced the visually interesting benefit of the sapwood looking like it's draped around the heartwood.

#### In the Workshop

#### Repairing a can punch

For many years my wife and I have had a can punch opener in our cutlery drawer. It's one of those things that you can't remember how you got it, but you can guaran-

tee that when you want it you can't find it or it's broken. In my case the retaining ring used to stop the handle from splitting had gone and when it was used last to cut a V shaped hole in the lid of a can the handle had cracked, split and came apart. One of my sons, on seeing the can punch opener, looked at me with that generation look and ask why we need anything like this when all drink cans come with a ring pull on the top of the can. I pointed out that sometimes the ring comes off without opening the can and at that stage the can punch opener comes into its own – his face went blank and he started to looking for the Age Concern phone number.



I could have just pushed the opener back on the handle, but if I had just done that the first time it was used it would have fallen apart. The best bet was to find a replacement retaining ring and replace the handle. I could have taken the easy way out and replaced the item with one on Amazon, but it has some sentimental value, so if it was not too expensive, I could reuse the metal head in a new olive wood body with a new retainer ring.

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#### Process for making a new handle for a can punch opener



I discovered that a 10mm pipe compression olive from a local hardware shop could be used as a replacement retainer ring and I selected olive wood (*Olea europaea*), over oak for the handle. So, I ordered a new olive wood blank and got



Using a depth gauge tool, I transferred the depth of the hole in the end of the handle to the drill. I marked the end with electrical tape, but you can purchase and use drill stop collar instead of tape.



Mount the new wood in a chuck and use the revolving centre to align the wood before tightening up the work in the chuck.



To stop the drill from skidding across the end of the work, use a centre bit to create a starter hole for the drill you intend to use.



With the lathe at a low speed to prevent overheating of the wood, drill down to the mark in the drill that represents the depth of the hole you need.



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By using a parting tool, mark and cut the length of the work. This will also act as a stop to help prevent you from hitting the chuck with the roughing out gouge.



After the wood has been rounded with the roughing out gouge, use a  $1\frac{1}{2}$ " skew chisel to reduce the size of the work.



I moved to a <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>" skew chisel as this gave me better control and a finer cut. I also cut the shoulder for the retaining ring and reduced and widened the gap at the end of the work, which gives you better access and control of the end of the work with the skew chisel.



Make sure that the retaining ring will only just fit. This is important as you will need to jam the can punch opener into the collar.



Mark out where you would like the beadings to be on the work and from the retaining ring end of the wood shape the work using a 3/8" spindle gouge to match the original handle shape.



Sand down the work through the grits from 80 to 400 grit.

I used Webrax to sand it down to 1,500 grit and that finally polished the wood with the white non-abrasive Webrax before adding any finishing.

I used only chestnut food safe oil on the work after sanding. No sanding sealer. You can use baby oil instead of food safe oil which is basically the same thing.



Finally, I sanded down both ends and applied the same finish. I used a rubber mallet to push the can punch opener into the end of the wood.■

Now all I need to do is find a can to use it on !!


