

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
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

Hello Graham,

Hope you are well and keeping safe.

This is my version on what I have called a "Penny Plate." It was made using Purple Heart from Brazil and measures 6x1 inches. When the plate was finished I cut out a hole in the

centre and fitted an old penny

coin dated 1967, the year my eldest son was born. It now shows Britannia on the inside and the Queens head on the reverse. I found the wood difficult to work with, hard to cut even with sharp tools and the wax polishing took a lot of elbow grease.



My second offering is a "Pedestal Bowl." This was made using Tulip Wood and measures 10x7 inches. The base and top of the bowl has been cut to form a channel which has gem stone chippings covered by clear epoxy resin. The bowl was sand sealed and waxed except the inside which was finished with three coats of Chestnut food safe oil.

TIP, When using epoxy resin, warm the resin and hardener in a bowl of hot water for five minutes before mixing. This gives you a few extra minutes before the mixture goes off.





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In the Workshop

Sanding Pads and Abrasive Discs By Philip Stephens

Hand held sanding discs. Use the friction and angle of the disc to rotate and sand the work. There is a vast array of products from suppliers, but I would like to think that my work is so good that it doesn't need any finishing using abrasives. However, that's not the case. No matter how good



you are, or how sharp your chisels are, you will need to do some sort of finishing using abrasives. Traditionally the art of hand sanding using abrasives is to remove the chisel marks and to prepare the work ready for sealing the wood and putting on a protective finish. The idea of using abrasives is that you start with a low graded grit to remove any major marks or blemishes – using grit will create its own rubbing marks. So, you have to use a smoother and smoother grit to remove the rubbing marks from the previous grit until any remaining rub marks are so fine you can't feel or see them. My wood teacher at school used to say "Always work with the grain". The problem with wood on a lathe is that it is rotating. The result is that is no matter what you turn, (bowl, spindle or final), you will have to sand across the grain at some point, which can lead to unsightly radial-sanding lines and an uneven finish.

For bowl work in particular this can be a problem, for as the bowl rotates you will be sanding with the grain, across the grain and against the grain for every revolution of the work. One of the ways to get around this problem is to use a sanding disc system and there are a vast number of hand-held and electric drill sanding systems on the market that can do the job. For the purpose of this article, I am only looking at the two most common types of sanding methods that can be used for woodturning work using disc abrasives.

Just a note on safety - whatever system you use, you will generate a large amount of wood dust in the workshop. So please use a good extraction unit, ventilate your workshop and wear a mask to protect your lungs when sanding.

most of the kit options revolve around using a 70mm or 50 mm pad system.



The Hope Pro Sander comes with only one 72mm (3 in) pad and one 47mm (2 in) pad. The unit also comes with a selection of 50mm and 75mm disc packs. The kit also does not have a 25mm (1' in) pad and no storage box, but does come with a selection of grits for both types of pads



The Robert Sorby Sandmaster comes only with a 50mm (2in) pad a small number of grits. A 70mm (3in) pad is available as an option

with the additional availability of bowl mop heads to fit the unit.

The Axminster Pro Sander comes with two 70mm (3' in) pads and two 50mm (2' in) pads and an adjustable head with Spanner. There is no 25mm (1' in) pad with this kit and no grit discs or storage box provided.



The Charnwood Deluxe Bowl sander package comes with two 50mm (2in) and two 75mm (3in) pads and is presented in a box with grit for both types of pads



Electric drill sanding systems. This is the simplest system to use and for this article I have assumed you would have a mains or battery-operated electric drill with arbor and chuck key that will support a sanding pad. If so, the only additional kit you will need is the abrasive discs.

Velcro Sanding Pads (standard and tapered)



Two standard types of Velcro sanding pads are available (standard and tapered) in all sizes (70mm, 50mm and 25mm), and with soft or hard padding. They will all accept a standard drill arbor.

I have used both mains and battery systems. However, it is easily possible to over sand or over heat the work. So short bursts of sanding at low lathe and drill speed will protect the work from overheating and any end cracking of the wood.





An alternative to using a drill is to mount the sanding pad in a lathe chuck. This is especially useful for the bottom of work when you have parted off the work and need to sand the bottom ready for finishing. Abrasive discs – There are a standard set of abrasive discs that have been factory cut and fitted with hooks for the sanding system. However, although commercially there are three diameters (25mm, 50mm and 75mm) each manufacturer has their own version of abrasive disc sizing that should be used with their version of the sanding system. The most common abrasives are 60, 80, 120,180,240 and 400 grits. I would recommend shopping around on eBay and Amazon as you can get the same abrasives in sets from 80 to 3000 grit. My only advice is to make certain that the abrasive disc is the same size or slightly larger than your sanding pad. This is to protect the Velcro covering on your sanding pad from becoming damaged and reducing the life of the pad. Abranet do make a set of mesh abrasive discs for the 50mm (2 in) sanding pad, but I have not seen it in other sizes.



You can of course make your own abrasive discs. I have used Nyweb pads cut to size with Velcro stick on tape which work well

Using Velcro to hold your pads in a line helps you to work down the grit and stops abrasive discs being wasted. I change the size line-up of discs to suit the pad I have selected





Abrasive discs will become clogged very quickly. You can clean the discs by mount the sanding pad in a lathe chuck and use an abrasive belt & disc cleaner stick to clean the pad.


IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT

Work by Terry Ivins

I had seen a piece of mahogany in the work shop and seeing it laying there in the dust and shavings it prompted the idea that out of it could be made at least something useful, ironically just as my mentor always says "One day you will make something useful,".

So being in the "useful one day mode" I made this box which is approximately 65.mm in height 90.mm in diam, the insert is a piece of beech 60.mm in diam, the finish is chestnut finishing oil.



It struck me as a big surprise that not having turned anywhere near as much as in the past, how literally out of practice I have become and how much more careful I have to be! Creating a jam chuck took 3 even 4 attempts and on two scraps of wood. Please don't tell Danny.







This is another box made from Mahogany but perhaps it is a bit more special as it is a gift for a lady who has been caring for her husband who had a bad heart attack out of the blue while walking his dog, very luckily an off duty doctor was driving down the road as he had just finished his shift at Warwick hospital which saved his life, right place, right time.

The total height is 100.mm and the

diameter is 80.mm, perhaps not proportional but Hey Ho! I think it works, I can hear him already !!!! The decorative bead and half bead are pieces of spalted Chestnut and set in the inside of the lid is a Swarovski 6 mm ruby crystal.

The outer top face of the lid has a

resin insert with what is marketed as fire opal pieces in the resin. Cheat



part coming up, the insert is what was left over from another piece, a bowl I think, and I left the unused resin to harden off in the small mixing vessel in which the mixture was formed. The resin button was trued up using double sided tape and mounted on a wooden face plate, I used a square ended scraper, very light cuts!, which enabled me to create parallel sides and a flat surface for the gluing process. Just a quick hint, I believe my mentor told me this so it must be true, which is that when the aperture for the resin insert had been created before finally setting the resin piece in place use a black felt tip on the face also sides that

has been turned, as this will be a good background for the resin piece to sit against and no grain pattern will show through the insert.

The resin was glued into position using 5 min epoxy, soon after the lid profile was created and after I used several grits down as far as 3000 to get the shine on the resin piece itself, Chestnut finishing oil was used to finish the pieces which needs a bit of patience as it is up to you as to just how many coats you apply.





These pictures show a small Laburnum dish which came out of a large log given to me some time way back, and which I was well aware that I really needed to use it up. I managed to make this thin

walled, 3 mm thick sweet dish 150 mm in diam and with a height of 35 mm which although straight forward it requires a bit of concentration while turning. Straight forward enough piece and finished using Cut n Polish Wood, Wax 22 and Microcrystalline.


in my garage to keep me occupied for some considerable time.
